Abstract: The robin holder collection documents robin holder's career as an artist and educator and her contributions to Black art. The collection particularly highlights holder's artistic work in series and her many public art commissions, her time as Assistant Director of the Robert Blackburn Printmaking Studio, and her decades-long career as an Artist Instructor with the nonprofit organization Studio in a School. Material formats include sketchbooks, exhibition catalogs, lesson plans, photographs, slides, and audiovisual items. The robin holder collection is arranged into 7 series, each with constituent subseries.

Acquisition Information

The robin holder collection was donated to The Driskell Center Archives by the artist robin holder. Materials were transferred to the Center in 2023, and the Deed of Gift was finalized in October 2024.

Separated Materials

The robin holder collection is housed in the Archives of The Driskell Center at the University of Maryland, College Park. Materials that are oversized or restricted for any reason have been separated and housed adjacent to the main collection.

Processing Information

This collection is currently in process. Materials are arranged into 7 series. The majority of the materials are paper-based, but series 6 and 7 are dedicated to photographic (series 6) and audiovisual (series 7) formats. III. Biographical Information

robin holder is an artist, educator, and activist born in Chicago and raised in New York City. She is best known for her printmaking, painting, and public art installations. holder graduated from LaGuardia High School of Music and Arts in 1969 and received a scholarship to attend the Arts Students League of New York from 1969 to 1971. There, she studied under Marshall Glasier, Vaclav Vytlacil, Morris Kantor, and Rudolf Baranik. Throughout the 1970s, she spent time in Mexico working on her art and at the Amsterdam Grafisch Atelier, where she studied lithography.

Education and instruction have formed a cornerstone of robin holder's career. She has held artist residencies through Studio in a School, the New York Foundation for the Arts, and various other organizations. She also served as the Assistant Director of the Robert Blackburn Printmaking Workshop from 1977-1986.

Much of robin holder's artwork focuses on themes relating to race, religion, gender, class, and social justice. Growing up as an African American Jewish woman placed robin at an intersection of marginalized communities in New York City that has inspired her artwork and fueled her social justice work. She was raised in activist communities and her brothers Kim and Mark both eventually joined the Black Panthers. holder decided at a young age that art could be her outlet, that art could be "creative" rather than "reactive".

IV. Scope and Contents

The robin holder collection documents the artist robin holder's career as a printmaker, painter, and art instructor. It contains material showing the process and exhibition of her works in series, as well as planning documents for her myriad public art commissions. One series is dedicated to her instruction, primarily through the nonprofit organization Studio in a School and the Robert Blackburn Printmaking Workshop. The collection is documented at the folder level and arranged into 7 series, including one restricted series of contracts and commission agreements, as well as constituent subseries.

VI. Series Descriptions

Series 1: Works in Series

This series documents robin holder's work in series, from process to exhibition. Notable series include *Warrior Woman Wizards*, *Outsourced!* (formerly titled *My Beautiful Red Dress*), and *Our Social Skin*.

Series 2: Public Art Commissions

As one of the first Black women to earn a public art commission in New York City, this series collects the mark robin holder's art has made in public spaces. Her largest projects and thus most heavily documented are *Camino de Animales*, completed for New York City Public School 5 on Staten Island; *Rites of Passage*, completed for High School Redirection in Brooklyn; *Portraits* + *Patterns*, completed in partnership with Studio in a School; and

Migration, completed for the Manhattan Transit Authority in the Flushing, Queens subway station.

Series 3: Teaching & Instruction

After returning from Amsterdam in 1977, robin holder joined the Robert Blackburn Printmaking Workshop as the Assistant Director, where she worked until 1986. She has held various teaching artist residencies, including at the Children's Museum of Manhattan, sponsored by Manhattan Graphics Center; El Museo del Barrio, sponsored by the New York State Council on the Arts; and at the Experimental Printmaking Institute at Lafayette College. The majority of this series' material relates to holder's decades of teaching with the nonprofit organization Studio in a School, where she was placed as an artist in residence at K-12 schools across New York City.

Series 4: Biographical Materials

This series includes resumes, artist statements, correspondence, published profiles, and various personal ephemera that give insight into robin holder's life. Much of this series is digital.

Series 5: Contracts and Commissions (RESTRICTED)

This series contains contracts and commission agreements between robin holder and galleries, institutions, and dealers. It is restricted to protect Personally Identifiable Information and other sensitive details. This series contains photographs of artwork, exhibitions, and other events.
